More money for the pedestrian and cyclist and less for the car please!



Walking and cycling ought to be among the first words on the paper when it comes to planning transport budgets. Yet the persistent impression given is that they are an irritating add on to the road transport budget. Currently only 1% of the Scottish Government's transport budget goes on walking and cycling.

Stop Climate Chaos works hard with coalition members such as Spokes, Transform Scotland and Sustrans to secure more funding for active travel options with benefits for health, safety and the environment.

If the Scottish Government is serious about delivering on its ambition for 10% of all journeys to be made by

bike by 2020, 10% of the transport budget should be allocated to cycling and walking.

We wrote to the Scottish Government in August 2013, calling on Ministers to double the funding for walking and cycling to £40m in the 2014-15 Scottish Budget. Recently, an additional £20m over the next two years was announced, which is to be commended, but total investment is still under 1.5% of the transport budget. Other aspects of the budget mean that cycling and walking investment will fall again in 2015-16.

This new money is certainly a result of continuing interest in cycling particularly and increasingly vocal groups across Scotland coming together to press for change. Organisations like Spokes, Transform Scotland and Pedal on Parliament have given a focus for people who are concerned about these issues. This autumn, Stop Climate Chaos, with Spokes and others, continues to build momentum for that change.

Take action

Email your MSPs today, calling for the budget for cycling and walking to be doubled next year and to increase each year thereafter until 10% of the total transport budget is allocated to active travel. **Go to bit.ly/16t5nhK** to take the action.

Climate change is happening, action is needed now

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the body set up by the United Nations to provide comprehensive assessments of the latest science on climate change, produced their 5th assessment report in September.

It confirmed that:

- warming of the climate is happening;
- there is a 95% probability that human influence has been the dominant cause of the observed warming since the mid- 20th century;
- each of the last three decades have been successively warmer at the earth's surface than any preceding decade since 1850.

Climate change is being increasingly linked to changes in regional weather patterns and increasingly extreme and more frequent weather events. Without urgent action, the effects across the world on, amongst other things, food production, health and political stability are likely to be catastrophic.



Significant effort is required to reduce global greenhouse gas emissions, including:


- A massive reduction in the burning of fossil fuels (coal, oil and gas);
- Reducing the amount of energy people use in their homes;
- A huge increase in the deployment of renewable energy;
- Less driving and flying, more walking and cycling.

A move to a green, sustainable economy could bring multiple benefits. The next two years leading up to a major UN climate change conference in Paris in 2015 will be critical. At that conference in 2015, it is anticipated that a new global deal on climate change, covering all countries, will be agreed.

We organise a demonstration in Edinburgh, called 'On Yer Bike!', which helps reverse planned cuts to active travel in Scottish Government's 2012/13 budget.

What's next?

Scotland has world-leading targets for reducing emissions and ambitious targets for creating renewable energy. Scotland must deliver on its climate commitments and ensure emissions reduce year on year in line with the Scottish Climate Change Act.

We also need other countries to commit to ambitious emissions reductions and to deliver climate justice for those in developing countries who are already suffering the impacts of climate change.
