# PRINCES ST FUTURE

Thank you to the many Spokes members who emailed their councillors in response our urgent email circular of 2 June.

Top officials and councillors had decided to go ahead with their original *Vision for the City Centre* - a 1-way traffic system which banned cycling eastbound in Princes St entirely, with no cycleroute in a huge paved area stretching from the shops to the tramlines.

Less than 24 hours before the Committee which was to approve this recommendation Transport Convener Lesley Hinds announced that a decision would be postponed until the next meeting [August] to allow further thought. The main factor was dissatisfaction by traders with the overall concept but, thanks to the extensive cycle lobbying, cycling aspects will be re-assessed too, with greater awareness of the arguments and of the strength of feeling.

# **POLICY CONSULTNS**

[more background in Spokes Bulletin 116, p6]

**By 14 June: Edinburgh Local Development Plan** – crucial plan guiding future of land use & transport in the city for years to come. Unfortunately Spokes has not had time to do a detailed response, but will submit main points. The plan includes a **Proposals Map** <a href="http://217.174.251.127/planning/EdinburghLDP.htm">http://217.174.251.127/planning/EdinburghLDP.htm</a> showing proposed paths/cycleroutes, which are then safeguarded from development. [Use your keypad arrow keys to move around the map].

One of the safeguards is for **footways/cycleways through the Astley Ainslie hospital site** [see blue dotted lines on the map]. We understand that there are objections to this safeguard – **if you support keeping this proposal please submit comments** [ditto if you have any other comments on the map or plan].

**Full plan details at** www.edinburgh.gov.uk/localdevelopmentplan. Comments/objections should be made on the Representation Form at the above site. Comments after 5pm on June 14 may not count.

**By 28 June: Central Edinb parking survey** – great to see this survey asks about problems *caused by* parking, not just problems *for* car parkers! Open-ended qns 6,10,18,20,21 allow comments.

**By A.S.A.P.: RPP2 Final Version** - the Scottish Government will shortly publish RPP2, its plan to meet its Climate Change targets. The consultation on the very disappointing draft RPP2 is over [see spokes.org.uk: documents: submissions: national: 1302] and Ministers are deciding now what changes to make. ### By 23 July: Scottish Government NPF3 & SPP

See the article on p6 of Spokes Bulletin 116 for background and web links: please look at the documents and consider commenting.

A member has sent us the following thoughts [abbreviated to fit] ...

These Planning docs are meant to underpin the climate change policy [RPP2 above] and help deliver those targets through a shift to less carbon intensive modes. There is a lot of positive rhetoric in NPF3 and SPP but it is not always translated into strong policy and so will probably again fail to deliver the required targets/outcomes. There is heavy emphasis on 'sustainable' economic growth through infrastructure investment (mostly roads and airports).

The consultation on NPF3 and SPP offers some opportunity but the options are limited and it is clear where the govt is heading: faster connections between cities; increased air traffic; little overall direction change for active travel (other than recreation) and leaving a lot of the actual work to Councils.

The active travel agenda would require Local Authorities to identify cycle routes and show them in Development Plans, with policies to deliver them, including identifying funds. Other than this there is not a lot different from now - and that is failing to deliver. There is no overall direction, no targets, no real obligation to make the policy work even if does appear in the final document.

There will still be a reliance on the *Designing Streets* document to deliver cycling/walking environments in developments but this is working poorly as a delivery mechanism - most gains are due to campaigners objecting at application stage (and really to be effective at the PAN stage) rather than councils by default implementing this policy. It certainly has not brought about a stepchange in how we design liveable places.

Also **national car parking standards** have not been altered. To encourage active travel, urban carparking ought to be progressively reduced, alongside better and more high profile cycle and walk facilities. There is no extension of current national cycle parking policy, which relates only to retail and business development.

It is good that a network of cycling/walking routes is a National Development in NPF3 [see Spokes 116, p6] along with the Central Scotland Green Network, but mostly this is routes already in place. There is also huge emphasis on recreation and tourism (=direct economic benefit) rather than on active travel (just a nodding glance to the health and economic benefits). And I know Spokes is disappointed that their request that each council should have a pilot sustainable-transport town was not included in NPF3.

There is nothing really bad but the documents are bland and fail to be 'good'. One big concern is **the emphasis on 'sustainable' economic growth**, which may override environmental concerns.

If economic concerns become Material Considerations there could be major negative impacts on how Planners consider proposals.

# **GREAT NEWS!!**

### **North Meadow Walk**

The rebuild of North Meadow Walk is a big step forward, and it's great to see a wider and pothole-free path! The Council is also promising 'Family Network' onstreet connections west to the canal and east to the Innocent path – hopefully in year 2014/15 but dependent on applications to Sustrans for match-funding.

The path rebuild is costing £360k, and it is worth remembering how the council got hold of this money at relatively short notice. www.spokes.org.uk/wordpress/2012/09/cycling-up-very-slightly-in-budget The money is only there because many Spokes members and others lobbied the government hard about the active travel cuts it planned in the 2012/13 budget 18 months ago, followed by PoP1. We were fighting for more investment in general - little did we or anyone know then that this would be one of the projects to benefit!

### **Leith Walk**

Revised plans for Leith Walk are a big improvement (walking & cycling) with many points now included from the joint submission by Greener Leith, Spokes and others [spokes.org.uk, 14.1.13 news]. See greenerleith.org.uk [8.6.13] a commentary on the new plans.

Many junctions are improved, notably removal of London Road roundabout; and there are significant stretches of segregated cycle route. A big disappointment is that the lower section of the uphill bike lane is not traffic-separated. However it is 1.75m wide instead of the usual 1.5m, and we will argue for a hatched area between it and the parking bays. Also, we don't yet know what is planned at and beyond Picardy Place roundabout, where the plans end.

The new plans result from two factors: heavy lobbying, led very effectively by Greener Leith, and Sustrans's insistence that they would only get involved if the original plans were made far more cycle and pedestrian friendly – and if the Council intended future extensions and links from Leith Walk towards other areas.

The new plans cost significantly more, especially because of roundabout removal, and require a Council application to the Scottish Government for additional cash – this might or might not be partly or entirely in the form of Sustrans match-funding.

### Leith Walk: HOW YOU CAN HELP

- ◆ Look at the plans. If you want to see them happen, email your MSPs [www.writetothem.com]. Ask them to speak to the Transport Minister about assisting Edinburgh Council to fund a project which could provide lessons for all councils if carefully monitored. This being an innovative scheme, an assessment of what goes well and what could be done better in future would be really valuable.
