## 1. Picardy Place consultation - Drop-ins Tue 21 Nov, Wed 22 Nov

The saga continues, with a final consultation prior to a Committee decision in January and work starting soon after that. Consultation opportunities are...

The plans and various explanations are at the above <u>consultation website</u>. You can click through the online response form without entering anything, to see the details, and then go back and fill it in later. Unfortunately even the latest set of plans is not fully clear on several aspects of what is intended, and some aspects appear to have worsened. Incidentally, a rather odd section of the consultation shows a rejected 'Y-junction' option which has been "discussed by Sustrans" – we have not spoken to Sustrans but we suspect this is not a Sustrans proposal – in any case it is not a vital part of the consultation.

### Important cycling issues on which you might wish to comment...

- ◆ Gyratory design we are very unhappy with the overall 'gyratory' design. Sadly there is very little likelihood of this being changed, but Living Streets has written this <u>background</u> and is running <u>a petition</u> which you may wish to sign you can personalise its message and title to include cycling aspects. We appreciate the Council's point that **buses will need to turn here** in future when Princes Street is traffic-reduced, but it doesn't need to be a gyratory or a facility for all traffic. Also, Picardy traffic could be considerably reduced by **keeping Leith Street closed** to all except buses, given that the present 10-month closure appears to be working well.
- ◆ A direct west-east route link York Place <---> Leith Walk is vital. In previous plans this was shown inside the triangle island, running beside the tram stop, leading to a road crossing just below Omni. In the new plan this cycleroute is gone, replaced by a grey band, and it appears that cyclists on this, the 'flagship' council West-East route, will have to detour via the front of the cathedral then across 2 very busy tightly-spaced toucan crossings near John Lewis.
- ◆ Leith St <--> Broughton St also needs to be direct and high quality. The previous plans again had a cycleroute within the island, but the new proposals mean 4 toucan crossings to get from Broughton St to Leith St, and travel from Leith St to Broughton St looks problematic.
- ◆ **Junctions** The various segregated cycleroutes seem to turn into shared space on the approach to nearly all the junctions just where cycle/pedestrian conflict is most likely. Segregated routes should continue, with side-by-side 'tiger' road crossings, rather than shared-use 'toucans.'
- ♦ Solution Assuming the gyratory remains, then high quality 2-way segregated routes on all 3 sides of the gyratory (inside and/or outside the gyratory as appropriate) linked by tiger crossings of the roads would cater for all main cycling desire lines. Finally, the segregated routes should be of adequate width ideally 3m, but they look narrow on the plans, down to 2m at one point.
