## PRINCES ST FUTURE

The Council consultation on Princes Street and George Street, Building a Vision for the City Centre, is now over.

As you know [Spokesworker 16.3.13] the proposal was to close the north-side carriageways of Princes St and George St to traffic, with widened pavements. George St, but not Princes St, would have a two-way cycleroute. Buses, taxis and bikes would travel west in Princes St, and eastbound (plus cars) in George St. The George St middle-of-the-road car park would remain. All eastbound cyclists would be diverted away from Princes St to the high-quality but round-about route along George St, then back again at the far end.

We had hoped to include here the consultation results and any changes to the proposals. Unfortunately they are still not online as we go to print, though are due imminently.

However we understand *informally* [and so this cannot be quoted as definitive] that the consultation found the following opinions...

- Princes St space should be better used before extending pavements
- Strong support for a Princes Street cycle route
- Strong support & little opposition for dedicated cycle route to the city centre [route not specified]
- Almost equal for and against the overall Princes St/ George St plan including the one-way motor traffic in the two streets
- Need for cycling 'permeability' ability to access all areas by bike.

Even assuming these are the corrects results, it does not mean that the council will necessarily implement them!! Indeed, since opinion appears to be split (and strongly felt both ways) on the one-way concept, it is far from obvious what the council will do! However, whatever the overall final plan, the consultation results seem to support cycling permeability, including for Princes Street.

The actual consultation results, and any council decisions, will appear at www.edinburgh.gov.uk/citycentrevision. Once you have seen them, tell your councillors what you think they should do!

## FOUND & STOLEN

Stolen Bikes UK - http://stolen-bikes.co.uk - is a register to record details about your stolen bike. The information is put out through various sources to spread the word and help recovery. The site includes advice to maximize the chances of recovering a bike.

Find That Bike - http://findthatbike.co.uk pulls together used bike adverts from eBay, Gumtree and other classifieds - the main purpose is to help bike theft victims search through the piles of bikes sold every day to ensure their stolen bike isn't one of them.

## SOME *URGENT* DATES

# **POTHOLES ETC!!**

### Improving the state of Edinburgh's Roads

It is not hard to see why the state of our roads causes people to comment or complain but how many of us do anything about it?

Local Councils are responsible for the maintenance of all local roads (not trunk roads). The City of Edinburgh Council aim to fix reported defects\* within 3 days. They claim a success rate of over 90% (97% for the most recently reported period Oct-Nov 2012).

As cyclists we know how dangerous road defects can be and Spokes encourages members to report these. Some may question the accuracy of Edinburgh's reported figures and we may also wonder how the authorities are failing to spot all the problems we see. However, they have no excuse when a report is made, so don't leave it up to someone else. The more we report problems on our roads the fewer these should become.

It is easy to report road defects - by email, phone or an online form. The email addresses and phone numbers of the Councils in Edinburgh and the Lothians are in the table below. For online reporting, please visit the website of the relevant Council.

Whether emailing or phoning you need to describe the problem and the *exact* location - the street or road name, the side of the road, and anything more precise such as "outside number 17". If you need to report several potholes or bad surfacing in the same general vicinity, you can give that description e.g. numerous potholes on Chester St near its junction with Palmerston Place.

Alternatively, CTC runs an online road defect reporting service at www.fillthathole.org.uk. For iPhone users there is an app that automatically captures the location and enables direct reporting. The app and website are particularly useful if you are not sure which Council area the defect falls within. CTC pass the reports on to the relevant Council for action.

• Defects can include potholes, rough surfaces, a broken, damaged or worn-smooth manhole cover, a blocked road drain, faulty street light or missing road markings. Potholes less than 40mm deep or smaller than a side plate may not qualify for repair. For some repairs, e.g. manhole covers, the Council may pass on the defects to utility companies to fix.

## **HOMELESSNESS TOUR**

We get many requests from charities to publicise sponsored rides etc, and usually can't do so, but we're giving a special mention to this one as it is particularly imaginative and bold.

Matt Fountain from Glasgow hopes to raise £100k for Shelter by cycling 2,000 miles around Britain, carrying all equipment on the bike, using a tent most of the time and sleeping rough other times. The route is designed to include areas most at risk of eviction and homelessness, where Matt will be talking with residents.

Matt is working with Natalie Byrom, of Warwick University Centre for Human Rights in Practice, to write a book from the ride

## **FUNDING YOUR IDEA**

Funding is available for local projects to encourage a shift from car to cycling. Other aims which will boost your chances are to reduce transport carbon emissions, and to improve community wellbeing by providing better cycling opportunities.

You need to set up or work with a local group to submit an application. Spokes in the past received a grant for work on encouraging family cycling with very young children.

Grants from very low amounts up to £6000 are available. Applications by Fri 5 July. The cash is from Cycling Scotland's *Cycle Friendly & Sustainable Communities Fund*.
