# SPOKESWORKER 4.3.16 updated 5.4.16 The Action-Update of Spokes the Lothian Cycle Campaign



Two national topics we hope will receive plenty attention are...

#### CYCLING INVESTMENT

Along with many other organisations and the WalkCycleVote.scot campaign, our top 'ask' is ...

... that the Scottish Parliament raises the proportion of its transport budget allocated to cycling and walking from the present 1.9% to 10% by the end of the next Parliament.



Whilst Councils are different to governments, Edinburgh Council is nonetheless a great example. Edinburgh allocated 5% to cycling at the last council elections, increasing by 1% a year, and will reach 10% by the end of the council's life, May 2017.

What is more, Edinburgh is the only Scottish Council which in the census achieved a reduced % of car use and higher bus, cycling and walk. Whereas the government has seen Scotland-wide car use rising, bus falling, and only a small cycling increase. Perhaps no surprise, given rising trunk road spending, and cycle investment at just 1.9% of total transport (though up from 0.9% two years ago).

Even our very modest proposal to reallocate a mere 1% of the government's £820m trunk road spending to active travel in the Scottish Government's 16/17 budget, to counteract funding problems such as the 26% cut in the Cycling Walking and Safer Streets budget, was rejected [spokes.org.uk 5.1.16 & 24.2.16].

#### **CUTS IN RAIL BIKE CAPACITY**

Despite the oft-stated government 'vision' to raise cycling to 10% of all trips by 2020 (currently 1%-2%) their transport agency, Transport Scotland, has approved plans which will worsen bike capacity on new and refurbished trains for the West Highland lines (Oban, Mallaig etc) and the Edinburgh-Glasgow main line.

We discovered this recently, so it is not in Spokes Bulletin 124, but there is a full article on our website, with extracts overleaf.

Please ask election candidates (at our hustings and elsewhere) not just what they would like to do if elected, but **what they will do right now!** Our understanding is that there is still just time for changes to the interior plans of the refurbished class 158 trains for the West Highland (and Far North) lines, or of the new class 385's coming to Edinburgh-Glasgow, Edinburgh-Dunblane, etc.

## **RAIL/BIKE SPACE CUTS**

... what is planned and what you can do

On the West Highland Line, Glasgow to Fort William, **Oban & Mallaig** 6 bikes can be booked at present - bookings which are often fully occupied, especially in the tourist season, with further potential visitors disappointed. Yet the replacement trains will be refurbished Class 158 trains with only 2 reservable bike spaces (plus 2 non-reservable spaces in one wheelchair space if that space is free). Thus even a small family of 2 adults and one child could not book space, let alone a group of friends.

Transport Scotland did not even consult on this change – but had they done so we would have argued that, since these trains will also be used on the Far North Lines, Inverness to Kyle and Wick/ Thurso, where current on-train bike capacity is very poor, six bookable spaces could have boosted cycle tourism there too.

Cycle tourism is important to the West Highlands and Islands economy and this cut will impact many small local businesses. A 2013 report by Transform Scotland found annual leisure and holiday cyclist expenditure in Scotland to be at least £106m, possibly up to £228m, and higher if mountain biking is included.

On the Edinburgh-Falkirk-Glasgow main line the current Class 170 trains have 2 bike areas, each with 2 official bike spaces. Despite train length being increased from 3-coach to 4-coach, with many more seats, the new Class 385 electric trains will have only one bike area (with 2 official spaces) plus an awkwardly shaped 'flexible space' outside the universal access toilet.

The one official cycle storage area will have fold-up seats (unlike current trains) irritating seated passengers if a bike gets on later. (NB: in both the old and new trains the official bike areas can squeeze in one or two extra bikes, at the guard's discretion).

The one 'flexible space' in the new trains is the circulation space outside the universal access toilet – on one side it is too short for a normal adult bike and on the other side it makes access to the toilet less convenient. During the consultation Spokes had argued for a well-designed flexible space in every carriage, to hold pushchairs, bikes, bulky luggage, etc. Instead, inflexibility looks set to be built-in, with users of bikes, push-chairs etc having to scurry along the platform to find the limited spaces.

#### Transport Scotland retreats further

As well as approving these tragic cuts in bike capacity, Transport Scotland has also announced that it will no longer attend the national rail/cycle forum which meets quarterly, with rail and cycling representatives, to discuss bike/rail issues in Scotland.

Since Transport Scotland is the body which implements the government's transport policy, this astonishing decision casts further doubt on how serious the government is in its 'vision' for 10% of all journeys to be by bike in 2020 – a vision now termed a 'commitment' in the *Infrastructure Investment Plan* accompanying the recent Scottish budget - but virtually impossible now to meet.

#### Facilities at stations – an alternative??

Abellio/ScotRail wishes to encourage travel to and from stations by bike and is introducing bike hire at a limited number, as well as improving bike parking – plans which we very much support.

However, on-train bike space remains crucial. Many people (holidaymakers as just one example) need to take their own bike(s) - and, in any case, Scotland has around 350 stations, with bike hire only likely at 15-20 of these in the next few years.

#### What you can do

It's not too late for Transport Scotland to re-think these disastrous decisions on two of Scotland's most important routes for bike/rail travel. The Edinburgh-Glasgow Class 385 electric trains and the West Highland Class 158 diesels are not yet at the stage of internal fitting out. If you are concerned, please help...

- Email your MSPs Since the decisions are primarily Transport Scotland's responsibility, urge your MSPs to ask the *Transport* Minister for a rethink. And say why bike/rail matters to you.
- Raise this with election candidates and at hustings. Ask what candidates will do *now*, given that work will soon be underway.
- If you have contacts in the tourism industry, or local businesses that will be affected, especially in the West Highlands, tell them what is happening.
- Retweet relevant Spokes tweets including our tweets about ... our hustings ... the Holyrood election ... Bike/rail cuts. These tweets can also be found high up in our twitter 'likes'.

- Our letter to Derek Mackay MSP, Minister for Transport and Islands Minister is here. Note that since it was written it has been clarified that on the Edinburgh-Glasgow trains, in addition to the official bike space, 2 bikes will also be allowed in the 'flexible space' near the universal access toilet – however this is far from ideal, as described above. What with also the folddown seats in the official bike space, overall provision is inferior to now – despite the trains having one more carriage.

## **NETHERLANDS TOUR**

Spokes member Iain Longstaff is organising a Netherlands cycling study tour in September, led by British exile and cycle planning expert David Hembrow. Iain hopes to attract a few people involved in cycle planning decisions, such as councillors and professionals, plus some ordinary Spokes members. He says...

It would be a great opportunity to see a place with some of the highest levels of cycling in the world and how that affects what we should be campaigning for in Scotland. The tour would visit Assen and Groningen, and will include the Assen school run. Details of the tours are at www.hembrow.eu/studytour.

The tour itself (i.e. excluding accommodation and travel to/from UK) is provisionally Sep13-15, costing £180-£315 each depending on numbers, which can be up to 12 people. Accommodation costs depend on where you stay, probably from £25-45 per night.
