SPWKES

People on bikes face sudden risks • Slow down around cyclists



- They may swerve round or stop suddenly for:
- Car doors
- Potholes and drains
- Pedestrians who walk out

- Look before you open your door
- Leave space behind and around cyclists
- Turning left in front of a cyclist traps them against the kerb
- Check for bikes that pass you on the inside
- · Give way before turning
- Always check your blindspot





- They get squeezed when there are:
- traffic islands
- built out bus stops
- road works
- parked cars

 Hang back until you have space and it is safe to pass



• For a cyclist, turning right means:

- crossing lanes
- exposure to on-coming traffic
- traffic pressure from behind

Junctions are hazardous places, especially for cyclists - 74% of incidents with cyclists occur around junctions

- Give oncoming cyclists a chance to cross
- Give them room to change lanes
- Wait behind them
- If you are turning right too, do not pass them on the left

Highway Code 163

- do not get too close to the vehicle you intend to overtake
- give motorcyclists, cyclists and horse riders at least as much room as you would when overtaking a car (see Rules 211 to 213 and 214 to 215).



Intelligent driving means

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Be Bike Alert

Casualties rise with closing impact speeds....

- at 20mph there is 1% chance of death
- at 30mph there is 6% chance of death
- at 40mph there is 30% chance of death
- at 50mph there is 78% chance of death

ALWAYS

- Slow down around cyclists
- · Look before you open your door
- Check for bikes on your inside
- Think blindspots on the left and from window pillars

OVERTAKING

- Hang well back until it is safe to overtake
- Leave plenty room when overtaking

JUNCTIONS

- Wait behind cyclists at junctions
- If you are about to turn left do not overtake bikes
- If you are about to turn right, do not pass on the left of a bike
- Give cyclists room to change lanes
