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1. City Mobility Plan & City Plan 2030 - ends 27 March

Edinburgh City Council has published for consultation its draft <u>City Mobility Plan</u> (basically the future of transport till 2030) and draft <u>City Plan 2030</u> (basically the future of use of land in the city till 2030). Alongside the already approved City Centre Transformation approved last year, these proposed policies represent a very big moment in the development of the City, so it is important to get them right and ensure plenty responses to the consultations from people concerned about sustainability and active travel.

We listed some relevant points from the Mobility Plan in our email circular of 11 Jan.

4. Updated Edinburgh Spokes Map

Due to continuing popularity of our Edinburgh map, we had to order a second reprint. We took the opportunity to do some revisions, adding the new Granton coastal route, the Shawfair railway path, a revised bike shop list and many small corrections /updates. The map is now on sale in bike shops or see spokes.org.uk/spokes-maps to buy by other means. *Note:* this is a revised edition 10, not a full new edition. We hope to fully survey Edinburgh then publish new edition 11 in 2021.

Work on our fully-surveyed Midlothian map continues, with many thanks to our local member surveyors and Andy who is doing the technical artwork. We hope the map will be out late spring/ early summer.

5. Bike access to public sites - volunteer(s) needed

People who like to get about by bike are often frustrated by poor bike access and parking at destinations, and poor *How to Get Here* information on destination websites, with no or inadequate cycling info. An example which our planning group has recently worked on is Murrayfield where all three aspects are pretty pathetic - but the same could be said of many public buildings, supermarkets, NHS sites and so on.

There is now a possibility of a major project to tackle this, prepare advice material and engage with site managers. Changeworks has applied for a large lottery grant to work with community groups to reduce Edinburgh's carbon emissions, and their application has reached the final shortlist. The grant would support a number of projects in Edinburgh, almost certainly including a Spokes project on this topic.

If the application succeeds we hope there would be money to employ consultants to do the donkey work of surveying sites and engaging with employers, but we would need a small group of people with a strong interest and willing to devote a certain amount of time in coordinating the project. Already one person from Spokes Planning Group and one from Resources Group have volunteered, but we ideally need a slightly larger group of 3 or 4 people, rather than just 2, to run the project. 6. Bikes abandoned on public racks - help needed

Sadly there are many examples of derelict bikes on public racks. They use space, look bad, and may give non-cyclists a poor impression of what it's like to use a bike in the city.

Edinburgh Council's system for reporting abandoned bikes is pretty obscure. Our understanding is that you have to notify the relevant Council Locality team. But few people even know that the Council has Locality Teams, let alone which team covers any given location where you may see an abandoned bike, or how to contact that team.



We are urging the Council to set up a more transparent system. There is clear information on the Council website for how to report many things. Just go to www.edinburgh.gov.uk and click Report It to see the many options – even reporting abandoned vehicles – but no option for abandoned bikes. If you are concerned about this, please contact your councillors and ask them for a Report It option for abandoned bikes to be added on this page of their website. Let us know if you get any useful replies.

Meantime, Spokes Planning Group member Richard Grant has offered to submit a report of abandoned bikes round the city to the Council, in the hope of at least getting a one-off clearup, and making the problem more apparent to the Council. **Please can you help by reporting abandoned bikes to Richard**. Note that we are merely *reporting* the derelict bikes to the Council, not touching them ourselves.

Richard will not have the time to visit every reported site himself to check the reports before submitting them, so *please follow the guidelines below...*

- Only derelict bikes on public racks (the 'Sheffield' racks usually on the footway) not bikes in tenements or on racks on the premises of businesses, employers, etc.
- State the exact location of the rack as fully as possible
- State whether the bike(s) are derelict, i.e parts missing or rusty chain off the chainwheel.
- If not derelict, say why you are sure they are abandoned. We wish all the reports to be pretty definite, not "I think this may have been abandoned". This is so that Richard's report is fuly credible to the Council and cannot be rubbished by whoever has to deal with it.
- If possible send a photo/photo(s).

7. Developer planning proposal exhibitions/consultations

- There are several types of application, for which the reference code may end in FUL, AMC or PAN.
- A PAN is a 'Proposal of Application Notice' consultation which developers are required to undertake
 for major developments before making a FUL (full) application. The PAN must include a public dropin exhibition, and you send comments to the developer, not the council. You can comment at the
 exhibition, but for major comments an email may be more reliable, and also gives you a record of
 what you said. The developer's subsequent FUL application must take account of these comments.

- Now enter the full reference code below into the 'keyword' box on the above website, then look at 'Documents.' For a FUL application, all details should be there. For a PAN, the document called 'Application Form' is likely to have time/place details of the exhibition(s) as well as contact details of the applicants, for further info. However details of PAN developments are not usually online but will be at the drop-in exhibition. It is worth contacting developers to confirm drop-in date/time/place as developers occasionally change them without the change appearing on the council website.
