0. Finding your councillors

In Edinburgh, find your ward & councillors by typing your postcode on <u>this page</u> [or <u>edinburgh.gov.uk</u> : Council & Committees : Find your Councillor]. Everyone has either 3 or 4 councillors, usually from assorted parties. For any Council, and to find MSPs, you can use <u>writetothem.com</u>.

1. Active Travel Action Plan ATAP (& other action plans) - ends Sun 9 July

Your last chance to comment on this important consultation

Please take the time to respond – you are helping to decide the Council's strategy and plans for active travel between now and 2030 – in the context of their target to cut car-km by 30% in the city.

How to respond (quick or slow!)

Steps marked * are essential, others are optional. If you only follow the essential steps and are fairly decisive it should only take you around 20mins.

1. Read or skim the Spokes response, here

2. Read or skim the <u>draft ATAP</u>. It is *very* long – chapters 5 & 6 are the most relevant to future cycling development. Also the actions on pages 86-95 of appendix 1.

*3. Decide one or more points you really wish the Council to include in ATAP. We suggest two below, but you may have your own ideas, possibly including something in your own area

*4. Go to the Council consultation page, here

*5. Click the online survey link on the consultation page, and complete the survey. All questions except for the very last, are multiple-choice, so you don't need to do any writing until the end

*6. For the last question, which is free-text, write in your concerns from (3) above.

7. If you would like to make a longer, more detailed submission (by 9 July!) you can email the address on the consultation page (<u>spatial.policy@edinburgh.gov.uk</u>). We suggest you complete the above survey anyway, but in the free text box say you will email detailed comments.

Two points Spokes has made, and you might like to consider making (use your own words) ...

(a) The promised segregated cycle network on main roads must be *continuous*. If there are sections, even short ones, where novices, those scared of sharing with traffic, or children, will not venture, then they won't use the route at all and the network will just be for the more confident. There will be places where space is tight, and ATAP hints that the network here may just consist of a bus lane or an 'open to all vehicles' shopping street. The answer instead must be – avoid gaps in the cycle network, by reducing traffic (e.g. parking changes, bus gate) so there *is* space for the cycle lane to be continuous. Yet the draft ATAP unfortunately doesn't say this - despite the Council's target to cut car-km by 30%.

(b) The draft ATAP promises a new policy to create a 'primary cycle network' of main road segregated cycleroutes – but leaves this till *after 2026!* We need to see early action if the public is to believe the promise. There is no reason why the Council could not upgrade one or more of the 'Spaces for People' main road routes in the next year or so, e.g. Lanark Road, or extend CCWEL out to Corstorphine, using cost-effective methods (as recently in <u>Holyrood Road</u>) and with greater protection at junctions.





4. Did you know??

4.1 Earth's hottest day since records began [does your MP/MSP know?]

- Talk of global heating is becoming so normalised that there was almost no coverage of the fact that July 3 recorded the hottest global average temperature ever. This record was beaten again on July 4, and worse is doubtless to come. <u>theguardian.com/environment/2023/jul/05/tuesday-was-worlds-hottest-day-on-record-breaking-mondays-record</u>.
- Change is happening at a scary pace now, it seems, in terms of just years rather than decades or centuries a daunting prospect for the years ahead. Yet action by governments, ours included, is dilatory at best. Scotland has missed its statutory emissions target, whilist the UK Foreign Office Minister dealing with environment, Zac Goldsmith, has resigned because of government "apathy" on the environment.

EDINBURGH CONSULTATIONS

6.1 City Mobility Plan, Delivery Plans including Active Travel Action Plan - ends 9 July

Major consultation - see (1) above

6.2 Union Canal (Edinburgh section) Strategy Refresh – ends 17 July

Edinburgh Council and Scottish Canals are working in partnership to update the Edinburgh Union Canal Strategy originally produced in 2011. Comments and ideas are wanted at this early stage. Consultation <u>here</u>.

6.3 New St Catherine's RC Primary School (Liberton/Gilmerton) – ends 7 August

Consultation <u>here</u>. This is an early-stage consultation, including location of the school, and is an opportunity to comment on routes to the school, community facilities at the new school, and bike storage and parking.

6.4 Spaces For People bike lanes, ETROs – consultation postponed

The 6-month <u>formal consultation [#6]</u> for the *Experimental Traffic Regulation Orders* for the *Spaces-for-People/Travelling-Safely* main road semi-segregated bike lanes was due to end on May 20th. However, errors have been found in the technicalities of the Orders, so they will have to be re-issued - which means another 6-month consultation period. Spokes has been assured that comments already submitted will still be taken into account.

6.5 Corstorphine Connections LTN (Low Traffic Neighbourhood) – ends 23 November

"Measures to promote quiet local neighbourhoods, encourage sustainable travel (walking and cycling), improve exercise local to home, and to deter motor vehicle through traffic in the areas of Corstorphine and Carrick Knowe, particularly around the Primary Schools."

The measures are now in place under an Experimental Traffic Order, ETRO/21/21. Comments and/or objections received may result in changes to the scheme, either during the course of the experimental period, or at the end if the Council decides to make the scheme permanent at that stage.

6.6 Bus Lane ETROs – ends 11 December

Bus lanes and/or restrictions on waiting/loading, at **Captain's Road, Drum St, Newtoft St, Duddingston Park South, Howden Hall Road, Gogar Underpass, Newbridge Edinburgh Rd (A89)**. This is an ETRO, so we presume the measures are all now in place, but on an experimental basis. Whether the schemes are kept, modified or scrapped will depend on the feedback to this consultation, as well as monitoring of the schemes. If you would like to influence what happens, please respond.

LOTHIANS CONSULTATIONS

6.7 East Lothian, Local Development Plan (LDP) – ends 17 September

Early comments being collected for this major policy document on development and use of land in East Lothian – including issues of transport, climate, etc. <u>Consultation Page and email/postal addresses for comments</u>.

6.8 Midlothian, Local Development Plan (LDP) – ends 31 August

Like East Lothian above, Midlothian is gathering initial ideas for its next LDP. It is doing this through a set of online surveys, as follows...

- Open Space Strategy
- Playing Outside survey
- Organisations and Businesses How Midlothian can be good for them

6.9 West Lothian Council: enquiries re new road & path developments - no closing date

The Council has a new webpage for **<u>enquiries & comments</u>** about new roads, footpaths, and cycle routes; and also a page of <u>**current projects and completed consultations**</u>.

6.11 Pavement parking – enforcement regulations – ends 28 July

Very belatedly, the government is consulting on the enforcement regulations which must be in place before the 2019 Act prohibiting pavement parking, double parking and dropped kerb parking comes into force. We haven't looked at this in detail, but are likely to support the proposals. <u>Consultation page</u>. If you respond, please send us a copy of your points.
